Watch the movie **Coco** together and talk about it. Paulo Freire, one of the twentieth century's most influential philosophers of education, said there is no learning without reflection, so the talking is as important as the movie-watching!

It's available to stream on Disney Plus (in both English and Spanish!), or from Amazon to rent/buy and stream or to buy as a DVD. I also have a copy of the DVD in the office that I would be happy to lend. Following is a synopsis:

Despite his family's baffling generations-old ban on music, Miguel dreams of becoming an accomplished musician like his idol, Ernesto de la Cruz. Desperate to prove his talent, Miguel finds himself in the stunning and colorful Land of the Dead following a mysterious chain of events. Along the way, he meets charming trickster Hector, and together, they set off on an extraordinary journey to unlock the real story behind Miguel's family history. Written by Disney/Pixar




From Common Sense Media: <u>Coco is Pixar's vibrant, emotional film about the Day of the Dead</u>. This tribute to Mexican traditions and customs has some sad moments, especially for those who've lost beloved relatives. But it also has powerful themes of perseverance, teamwork, and gratitude, and it encourages audiences to love and appreciate their family and to follow their dreams, all of which means there's plenty for families to talk about after watching this <u>Common Sense Seal</u>-honored film. Try these discussion questions for kids:

- Families can talk about the popularity of stories about young characters who must go on a dangerous journey to find out about themselves. What does Miguel learn in *Coco*? How do his experiences in the Land of the Dead help him grow?
- Talk about the movie's theme of family duty vs. personal ambition (and following your dreams). Which characters in *Coco* are <u>role models</u>, and which <u>character strengths</u> do they demonstrate?
- Did you think any parts of the movie were <u>scary</u>? <u>How much scary stuff can young kids</u> handle? Who do you think is the ideal audience for this movie? Why?
- Did you already know about the Day of the Dead? If not, what did you learn about the holiday? How does your family pay tribute to relatives and loved ones after they've passed away? Which other Mexican traditions and values does the movie promote? Which holidays, music, and other cultural traditions do you celebrate with your family?
- Did you notice that characters speak both English and Spanish in the movie? Would you like to learn a second language? For bilingual families: Why do you think it's important/useful to speak two languages? How does that connect you with your heritage -- and your family?

- Or work a maze to get Miguel back to Coco, his great-grandmother (pg. 12).















Unfortunately, the only images I found are of a two-parent model, which does not allow for poly families or for stepparents. Thankfully, there are online family tree builders that can offer more.
