

Roll out dough to 1/4-inch thickness on lightly floured work surface. Cut into gingerbread men shapes with 5-inch cookie cutter. Place 1 inch apart on ungreased baking sheets.</li> <li>Bake 8 to 10 minutes or until edges of cookies are set and just begin to brown. Cool on baking sheets 1 to 2 minutes. 

### SIDE WITH TENNESSEANS AFFECTED BY COVID

# A COVID-Related Action by NOAH (Nashville Organized for Action and Hope), an organization of which FUUN is a member.

In Tennessee to date, 5000+ of our fellow citizens have died from the COVID-19 virus. In all areas of the state, our brothers and sisters continue to suffer.

Many who have no money for rent are facing eviction. Families struggle to provide adequate food and health care. Jobs for many have shut down or disappeared entirely.

Governor Lee still refuses to issue a statewide mask mandate, even though COVID deaths are *twice* as high in counties with no such mandate. On November 17, Governor Lee said, "The strategy we are taking is actually working... may be working better than a mask mandate would." On that date, 3995 Tennesseans had died of COVID-19. On December 8, that number had climbed to 5,109.

NOAH is asking that Governor Lee and our state government do the following:

- Issue a statewide mask mandate;
- Immediately free up the surplus of \$740 million in federal TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families) funds to help low-income families with children.

NOAH is holding a PUBLIC ACTION on *Tuesday, December 29*, calling on Governor Lee to take these actions.
